Our government officials continue to argue with each other while at the same time pushing for a healthcare option that seems to do the exact opposite of provide healthcare. And on top of all of this, our President seems to be on the verge of inviting war with North Korea while the country becomes preoccupied with NFL players' protest of our country's injustice and racial bias. It's almost too much to handle.

And while everything happens around us, we as a church had an inconclusive vote on the future of our building on September 10th. Although our future, and the future of our building are important, they are not as important as our faith community and its faithful responses to the world around us. We are more than our building, and we are more than the vote that happened on September 10th.

We are people of the Table, and in October we celebrate World Communion Sunday. This Table that is such a part of who we are represents a community that extends beyond these walls; a community that comes together from a diversity of backgrounds and opinions; a community that comes together and is reminded of the relationship it shares with the ministry, death and resurrection of Jesus the Christ. This same meal that we celebrate each Sunday reminds us of a time when the disciples did not know what Jesus meant when he told them that he was not going to be with them; a time when the disciples wondered who would betray their leader; and more importantly what does it look like to live as a community without Jesus.

"I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." Isaiah 43:19



- Moderator, Laura Robinson, calls the meeting to order with 38 members in attendance.
- The Laura gives review of the purpose of this meeting: to vote on the disposition of the church building.
- The Transition Team has provided much information on this topic.
- Y Laura explains: according to our By-Laws, a quorum, the minimum fraction of members of the congregation that must be present at any meeting to validate the proceedings, must be met in order to vote on changes to property. Quorum is met with more than 20 persons out of our official member census of 97, present today.
- Proxy Votes did not count towards this quorum, but do count towards the 2/3 vote.

Y Since the vote does not meet the 2/3 requirement for any one path forward, we will continue to study our options with another congregational meeting and vote in our future.



Lummi Totem Pole Journey 2017

October 14th,

2:00-4:00 pm with 1:30pm blessing University Congregational Church (4515 16th Ave NE),

In the last several years, the Pacific Northwest has been bombarded with first coal and then oil export proposals. Thanks to the hard organizing work around the state, most of those proposals have been stopped. But more dirty proposals have success in the Northwest will be the inspiring emerged: fracked gas and petrochemicals, which deepen our dependence on fossil fuels. Last year, the Lummi Nation prevailed in its fight to block the largest coal port ever proposed in North America. The proposed Cherry Point coal terminal would have sat on the ancestral lands of the Lummi Nation known as Xwe'chi'eXen. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the agency reviewing permits ruled that the project would be an unacceptable infringement on Lummi treaty fishing rights. We've made progress, but also face a long road to protecting what we love. To draw attention to that this year, members of the Lummi months and seen by at least 200,000 people.
